
Empathy & kindness: This individual consistently shows up with compassion.






Keynote Address: George M. Johnson

George M. Johnson is an Award-Winning Black Non-Binary Writer, Author, and Activist located in the NYC area. George has written for major outlets including Teen Vogue, Entertainment Tonight, NBC, The Root, Buzzfeed, Essence, Ebony, THEM, and The Grio. They have also served as Guest Editor for BET.com's Pride month. In 2019, they were awarded the Salute to Excellence Award by the National Association of Black Journalists for their article "When Racism Anchors your Health" in Vice Magazine. Their debut Young Adult memoir, ALL BOYS AREN'T BLUE, was published in 2020, followed by their next YA memoir, WE ARE NOT BROKEN. George is also a proud HBCU alum twice over, and a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Incorporated.

Live poetry performance: Yosimar Reyes


Yosimar Reyes

Yosimar is a nationally-acclaimed Poet and Public Speaker. Born in Guerrero, Mexico, and raised in Eastside San Jose, he explores the themes of migration and sexuality in his work. The Advocate named Yosimar one of "13 LGBT Latinos Changing the World" and Remezcla included him on their list of "10 Up And Coming Latinx Poets You Need To Know."

Yosimar's first collection of poetry, For Colored Boys Who Speak Softly... was self-published after a collaboration with Carlos Santana. His work has also been published in various online journals and books including Mariposas, Queer in Aztlán, and Coming Out. He was featured in the Documentary, "2nd Verse: The Rebirth of Poetry." He is a LAMBDA Literary Fellow as well as the recipient of the Undocupoets Fellowship.


Opera Performance: Breanna Sinclairé

Breanna Sinclairé

Breanna was brought up in Baltimore by parents who played various musical instruments. It was above all her grandmother who encouraged her to sing in the Baptist church choir and take an interest in opera. Breanna obtained a scholarship from the California Institute of the Arts and began her transition in her last year there. She went on to receive her master's degree at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music in 2014. After studying with Sheri Greenawald at the San Francisco Opera, she began performing repertoire as a lyric soprano. In June 2015, Sinclairé made history by becoming the first transgender woman to sing The Star-Spangled Banner at a professional sporting event when she sang at the Oakland Athletics Stadium to a crowd of 30,000.

Breanna Sinclairé is the subject of a documentary film, Mezzo, which screened at the 2016 San Francisco Transgender Film Festival.




